"Environmental education not only changes minds but also the future of generations."

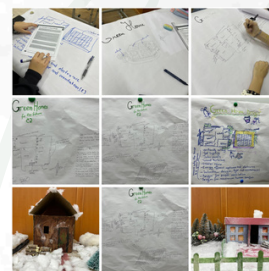
The European GreenGenerations project, an innovative initiative dedicated to intergenerational learning and raising awareness of climate change, was successfully implemented at Centrul de Excelență, Galați. The program involved 7 teachers, 118 students, and 57 adults, including parents and external experts, strengthening the shared commitment to a sustainable environment.

Through interactive workshops, experiential activities, and educational sessions, participants explored essential topics for sustainable development, such as the Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs), reducing carbon footprint, recycling, energy efficiency, the use of eco-friendly and sustainable transport, and sustainable food systems. The program encouraged active participation, critical thinking, and the development of key competencies for a sustainable future.

One of the most important outcomes of the project was the promotion of intergenerational collaboration, facilitating the exchange of knowledge between students, parents, and experts. Open dialogues and joint activities contributed to a deeper understanding of climate challenges and potential solutions. Participants particularly appreciated the program, highlighting its practical approach and the impact of environmental education in shaping responsible attitudes toward the environment.

GreenGenerations demonstrated that sustainability is not just a theoretical concept, but a lifestyle that inspires action and responsibility.

As the project evolves, the experiences and lessons learned from the pilot at Centrul de Excelență, Galații will contribute to the expansion of the initiative at a European level, strengthening the mission to shape a greener and more sustainable future for all.





Pilot implementation of the GreenGenerations Curriculum at the 1st Primary School of Alexandria

The 1st Primary School of Alexandria successfully hosted the pilot of the educational activities within the European GreenGenerations project, an initiative dedicated to intergenerational environmental education. The program involved 7 teachers, 63 primary school children, and approximately 60 parents, thereby strengthening the collaboration between school, family, and community for a more sustainable future.

Environmental education must start at a young age because children are the responsible adults of tomorrow. Through interactive and experiential activities, the students discovered the importance of recycling, energy saving, green homes for harmony with nature, and the responsible use of natural resources. The involvement of parents in this process had a significant impact, contributing to the formation of a community aware of environmental challenges and capable of taking concrete actions for a sustainable future.

Through games, experiments, and practical projects, the children developed positive attitudes toward the environment, while open dialogue between students, teachers, and parents fostered the exchange of ideas and best practices for protecting nature. GreenGenerations shows that environmental education is not just about learning, but also about inspiring change and cultivating a sense of duty across all age groups.

The experiences from the pilot at the 1st Primary School of Alexandria will serve as the foundation for expanding the project at a European level, contributing to the creation of a generation that not only understands the importance of sustainability but also takes action to put it into practice.
